Guest Commentary

Building Entrepreneurship into the Fabric of the University



This issue of the newsletter includes the first of a two-part series by Julie Messing on building entrepreneurship across the Kent State University system. The first part, "Building Entrepreneurship into the Fabric of the University", describes the growing entrepreneurial programs at KSU. Next month we will continue with the second part on "Creating a Culture of Inclusive Innovation".

As I approach 13 years in the innovation & entrepreneurship space in higher education, I continue to be impressed with the energy and entrepreneurial spirit of students and inspired by the quality and breadth of offerings from campuses across the country. Participating in the Deshpande Symposium each year has exposed me and my colleagues to a wide range of outstanding programs, educators and leaders. The spirit of sharing best practices and building relationships with peers at a variety of institutions has had a direct benefit on our programming at Kent State. During our first Deshpande Symposium, we were exposed to the University Innovation Fellows program and were immediately hooked. We have had 10 Fellows to date and they have been key to the growing innovation culture on our campus.

Kent State students have taken the path of entrepreneurs for decades - well before entrepreneurship courses or co-curricular activities were offered. This became apparent as I met several students that formed entrepreneurship clubs before any other offerings were in place. The development and growth of entrepreneurship support on our campus began in the College of Business in 2006. This program was the seed that brought awareness and appreciation for an entrepreneurial mindset.

In 2012 we embarked on a new path, [Blackstone LaunchPad](#), where we expanded the entrepreneurial culture to serve students from every Kent State college and campus by helping them transform innovative ideas into successful ventures as well as giving students the opportunity to connect to the plethora of resources across our region. In 2016 the program evolved into [LaunchNET](#), part of the [NEOLaunchNET](#) network powered by the Burton D. Morgan Foundation.

At Kent State we are experiencing an energizing culture shift where collaborative innovation is being woven into the fabric of the university, and we are pleased to be leading the way. We are proud of our impact yet remain humbled by the powerful lessons that we are learning from our peers across the country as we continue our journey as an innovation and entrepreneurial hub for the university.

The Michelson 20 MM Foundation and NACCE Launch Intellectual Property (IP) Education Pilot in 10 Community Colleges



In the late fall of 2016 as part of National Entrepreneurship Month, the White House recognized NACCE for its leadership and participation in national initiatives that promote innovation and entrepreneurship and was encouraged to announce a new initiative for 2017 that advanced the organization's work in the area.

With the aim of accelerating effective collaboration and innovation between community colleges and universities, NACCE chose to highlight a new intellectual property (IP) education pilot funded by the Michelson 20MM Foundation that is in the early stages of launching. Intellectual Property comprises 45 percent of the country's total GDP today and represents 80 percent of the market value of all publicly traded companies in the United States. The goal of the pilot is to identify early IP champions with a lead college responsible for developing a master syllabus and nine supporting colleges adopting and/or adapting these materials for their respective courses.
